SOLEMNITY OF MARY, THE HOLY MOTHER OF GOD



Today, we celebrate the **Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God**. As we hear in Galatians: *God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to ransom those under the law*. As Catholics, we believe that our Savior, Jesus Christ, is both fully human and divine. Therefore, the Church confesses Mary to be truly the “Mother of God” (CCC 495).

When the angel announced to Mary that God had chosen her to become the mother of Jesus, the Son of the Most High God, Mary had a choice. She could have said no. Instead, in humility and perfect fidelity, Mary responded “yes” to what God was asking of her. As a result of her freely given consent to the will of God and her cooperation with God’s grace, the Blessed Virgin Mary conceived our Lord and Savior, Jesus, in her womb by the power of the Holy Spirit.

As today’s second reading tells us, God sent his Son to be born of a human mother so that we all might become sons and daughters of God. As proof that we are God’s children, *God sent the spirit of his Son into our hearts*. However, it is up to us to open our hearts to the Holy Spirit, and to respond to the Holy Spirit’s promptings.

Like Mary, we have a choice. We can allow the Holy Spirit within us to guide and direct us, or we can say no. We can choose to ignore the holy nudges we receive. If our lives are crowded with too much noise and activity, it’s likely that we may fail to be attentive and responsive to the promptings of the Spirit stirring within us. That’s why it’s so important to take quiet time and listen to God so we may do his will and be faithful to his call for our lives.

We hear in today’s Gospel that *Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart*. Let’s do the same.

On this first day of the New Year, we review our goals and make resolutions to discipline ourselves by losing weight, exercising more, or other similar efforts. What if we take some quiet time to listen to what God’s plan for us might be in the year ahead? What if we reflect on whatever we hear in the silence? What might happen if we choose to act on God’s plan for us as the days, weeks and months of this New Year unfold? Very simply, our lives will be changed so that more and more we will come to share Christ’s light, love and peace with all those we encounter. Wishing you and your family and happy and healthy 2023 – thank you for praying with us today! Happy New Year!

Let us pray to be open to the promptings of the Holy Spirit and the grace to respond and go where the Spirit leads us. *The Lord bless you and keep you! The Lord let his face shine upon you, and be gracious to you! The Lord look upon you kindly and give you peace!*

Our Saint of the Week St. Elizabeth Ann Seton



Elizabeth’s Episcopalian parents handed on to her their own faith. Her mother and stepmother taught her to pray and read Scripture. Her father, a doctor, taught her to love and serve the poor. As a young girl, Elizabeth took food to the poor near her home. After she was married, she and her sister-in-law Rebecca visited the poor and sick in slums.

Elizabeth was prepared for New York high society. At the age of nineteen she married handsome William Seton, the son and business partner of the owner of a wealthy shipping firm. No one could have guessed the plans God had for her. Will and Elizabeth were devoted to each other. They loved their five children—three girls and two boys. Everything went well until 1803, when Will Seton’s business went bankrupt and his health failed. The Filicchi family in Italy invited Will, Elizabeth, and their oldest daughter Anne to visit so that Will could recuperate in the warm, sunny Italian climate.

The journey was rough. Because there had been an epidemic in New York before the Setons left, when they landed in Italy the police quarantined them in an old fort. If after six weeks they did not come down with the disease, they would be able to enter Italy. Will, already ill, had to lie in the cold, damp room. Elizabeth cared for him as well as she could, but a few weeks after they were freed, Will died.

The Filicchis, who were Catholic, helped Elizabeth. Finally, she realized that God was calling her to become a Catholic. She went to a priest to learn about the truths of the faith. Later, she and her children became Catholics. Because of their decision, her family and many friends turned against her, and she found herself on her own.

To support herself and her children, she opened a Catholic boarding school for girls in Maryland. Women came to help Elizabeth, and the school grew. Soon it seemed obvious that God was asking Elizabeth to dedicate her life completely to him. She and the other women began a community of religious women known as the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph’s. Elizabeth Seton received the title of “Mother,” head of the community. They followed an adapted version of the Rule used by the Daughters of Charity founded in 1633 in France. After Mother Seton’s death, her community grew into several independent new congregations of Sisters of Charity in the U.S. and Canada. In 1850, the remaining Sisters of Charity of Saint Joseph’s joined the Daughters of Charity of Saint Vincent de Paul of Paris, France.

Elizabeth raised her children. Her two sons entered the navy. Anna became a nun but died at an early age, as did Rebecca. Catherine became a Sister of Mercy and worked with those in prison. Today thousands of Daughters of Charity carry on Mother Seton’s work. They serve in hospitals, homes for the aged, and schools.

Who was the first person born in the United States to be declared a saint? Who opened the first American Catholic parish school and established the first American Catholic orphanage? Who founded the first native American religious community of women? The answers to all these questions are the same: Elizabeth Ann Bayley Seton.

FAMILY CONNECTION

God speaks to us in many ways, including through the Sunday Scripture readings. The Sunday Connection provides useful background and activities to better understand the upcoming Sunday's Scripture readings, helping you to connect the Scripture to daily life in a meaningful way.

The Octave Day of the Nativity of the Lord Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God Sunday, January 1, 2023

Today's reading is a continuation from the Gospel proclaimed at the Christmas Mass at midnight. In it the shepherds act upon the message they receive from the angel and go to find Jesus in the manger in Bethlehem. In their visit to the manger, the shepherds find things just as the angel had said. The shepherds' visit, therefore, is a moment of fulfillment, manifestation, and the beginning of the salvation we receive through Christ.



In the context of today's Solemnity, this reading also helps us focus on Mary as the Mother of God. The reading tells us at least three things about Mary as a mother. First, Mary is described as a reflective person, keeping the reports of the shepherds in her heart. Second, we are reminded of how obedient Mary was to God when she named the baby *Jesus* as the angel Gabriel had directed. Third, this reading shows Mary and Joseph faithfully observing their Jewish tradition by having Jesus circumcised.

Mary's faithfulness to God is evident in all three of these things. Her reflection upon the events in her life indicates that she was a person of prayer. This prayer made possible her obedience to God and God's will, even if the outcome was not clear. Finally, her faithfulness to a community of faith grounded her relationship with God and enabled her to participate in God's plan of salvation.

Because of Mary's faithfulness to God, she was able to receive the gift of God's Son and accept her role in God's plan for salvation. By doing so, she models for us the path of discipleship and is also called Mother of the Church.

Our call to discipleship also includes these three aspects. First, discipleship means prayer and reflection on the events of our lives that we might see God's presence and work in our lives. Second, discipleship means obedience to God and God's will. Third, discipleship includes fidelity to a community of faith.

2023 Mass Intention Book Now Open!

Due to a large volume of Mass requests and in order to be fair to the needs of our parishioners, the following is the Mass Book Policy:

1. Only registered Parishioners can request up to a maximum of 10 masses/year.
2. Only 2 of those Masses may be on weekends depending on availability - this makes it fair to all parishioners who wish to have a weekend Mass.
3. Mass intentions cannot be reserved by phone or via SMS. Requests must be submitted in writing or e-mail.
4. via email. You may drop your requests together with your donation payment at the Collection basket or at the Parish Mailbox or slow mail to the Parish Office.
5. Not all dates are available, so we ask that you be prepared with alternate dates and times. If your requested date is not available, an alternate date shall be chosen.
6. Mass Intentions are at least \$10 each. If you're paying by check, Check Memo should indicate - Mass intention on xx/xx/23 (date) OR Mass intention for xxx (name) OR No. of Mass intentions;
7. Allow time for processing and provide your email or phone no. to confirm your masses

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

On this feast, we can see how devotion to Mary has been a beacon of hope to the sick throughout history. In the new cathedral of Los Angeles, the faithful enter through a single door topped by a striking sculpture of Mary with arms stretched down in compassion. Sculpted into the massive bronze doors are the titles of Mary most treasured by various cultures. Many of them speak of how the sick are consoled by a sense of Mary's presence.

Dorothy Day once recalled St. Bonaventure's remark that after the Lord's long forty days of fasting in the desert, when he was diminished and weak from his struggle, the angels who ministered to him went first to the Blessed Mother's house. There they saw the soup that was on her stove, and took some to the Lord so that he would delight in it even more since his mother had prepared it. "Of course," said Dorothy Day matter-of-factly. In praying the rosary and savoring the stories of Mary's steadfast love in the face of all suffering, the sick are strengthened by one of our tradition's most shining treasures, and the whole Church is enriched.

- To God - your life.

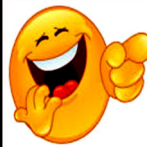
BLESSINGS

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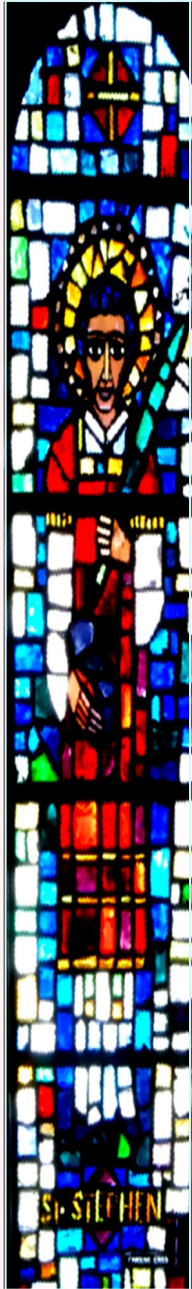


This Week's Scripture Humor
