



FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Deuteronomy 18:15-20; Psalm 95; 1 Corinthians 7:32-35; Mark 1:21



In last week's Gospel from Mark, we heard the call of the first disciples, and today those new disciples were with Jesus on the Sabbath as he *entered the synagogue* [in Capernaum] and taught. While Mark does not record what Jesus taught at this particular time, he does tell us the reaction to it: The people were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes.

This moment is followed by Jesus' expulsion of an unclean spirit from a man, and Jesus' interaction with the demon is telling. Jesus recognizes the demon as the very antithesis of the kingdom and the demon recognizes Jesus as the *Holy One of God*. While the demon taunts Jesus, Jesus silences the demon in response and orders

him to come out of the man. Once more, the people are affected: they are amazed and question one another as to what is happening.

Writing for a community suffering under the oppressive regime and power of imperial Rome, Mark is encouraging his listeners by reminding them of Jesus' power and promises. Two millennia later we, too, are challenged by our own demons, personal and communal. We, too, desire words of encouragement and a reminder that Jesus is the Holy One who liberates and acts with true compassion. This Gospel serves as a reminder of that.

Saint Paul's letter to the Corinthians today can be of help in this as well, when he says, *Brothers and sisters: I should like you to be free of anxieties.* Most, if not all of us, would agree with him! Writing for a community that expected the Second Coming to happen imminently, Paul is communicating a message of hope. He is telling them that the circumstances and conditions of earthly existence (being married or unmarried in this case) are important, but they are of less significance than the new life we are all called to in Christ.

In other words, he is reinforcing for them – and therefore for us – the transitory nature of this life. And as such, our state in life should be of less concern than our state in the kingdom. Wherever we find ourselves, we are to answer God's call and [adhere] to the Lord without distraction.

Paul's message of hope, along with Mark's encouraging message of Jesus' power and promises, are a reminder that the *Holy One of God* has liberated us from death and sin – that the difficulties and trials of this life are, in the end, overcome. We have certainty that with faith in the risen Lord, we are destined for an eternity with him.

So let us go forward to the Eucharist in faith and sing joyfully to the Lord, as our psalmist says, coming into his presence with thanksgiving ... For he is our God, and we are the people he shepherds, the flock he guides.

February 1, Our Saint of the Week: St. Bridgit



Saint Brigid is the patron saint of fire, healing, midwives, and childbirth. She's a bit of a busy bee. We celebrate her feast day on February 1st, which is known as *Imbolc*, one of the great fire festivals of the Irish.

As the shamrock became associated with Saint Patrick, a tiny cross made of rushes was linked with Saint Brigid. And they are made for her feast day traditionally throughout Ireland. One of my favorite poems celebrates this weaving as Brigid wove a cross by the bedside of a dying chieftain's bed. Here's how it goes:

Brigid wove a cross of rushes by a dying chieftain's bed. "Brigid, what's that you're making there in the rushes?" the chieftain said.

Brigid said, "It's a cross I'm weaving, the cross where Jesus died."

"Who was this Jesus?" asked the chieftain, "And why was this man crucified?"

So Brigid told the Gospel story to the dying pagan king. Silently he listened, never saying anything. Then he kissed the cross of rushes, saying, "Brigid, thanks to you, I've come to love this Jesus. I will follow his way too!"

Well, lest you think that Saint Brigid is just for the Irish or perhaps even just for Christians, let me tell you that she is a woman for every age, for her legacy can be found right down in every marriage today. What do I mean by that? Well, during the age of chivalry, Saint Brigid was so revered as a model for women of every age for her wisdom and her courage, that gentlemen, knights, and nobles began to call their sweethearts their "brides," or their "Brides," a nod to Saint Brigid.

Things About To Become Extinct

Among the many predicted extinctions are the imminent demise of the Yellow Pages, movie rental stores, phone landlines, VCRs, Ham radio, incandescent light bulbs, cameras that use film, and the milkman. In fact, some extinctions are good. When things are no longer useful, when things do not function in a helpful way, or just aren't sensible anymore, they should become extinct.

In today's Gospel text Jesus acted as an agent of extinction. When Jesus entered into the local synagogue in Capernaum it was time for the unclean spirit inhabiting that a person in that place to go elsewhere. The presence of Jesus, whom the unclean spirit declared to be "the Holy One of God," left no room for the unholy attitude and actions of that demon. Go exorcize some demons this week! Make a list of things you want to go extinct in your life, and then stop feeding them: greed, jealousy, anger, hypocrisy, selfishness.... Change the climate in your home and in your heart. Make the climate in which you live inhospitable to hatred, a wasteland for bigotry, a desert for envy.

If the only prayer you said in your entire life is 'thank you' - That would suffice

Additional Thoughts on Today's Gospel

Jesus and the disciples that chose to follow him in last week's Gospel arrive at Capernaum, a small village on the Sea of Galilee. Jesus teaches in the synagogue on the Sabbath. Mark reports that the people respond to Jesus' teaching with astonishment, noting Jesus' authority and contrasting it with the scribes'. Early in Mark's Gospel we already find evidence of the tension that will manifest itself fully in Jerusalem..

After Jesus' preaching, an even more astonishing thing happens. A man possessed with an unclean spirit calls out to Jesus. As we see in this example and throughout Mark's Gospel, the spirits and demons seem to know Jesus and are often fearful of him. In fact, they seem to understand Jesus' identity better than his disciples. As we will read again and again in Mark's Gospel, Jesus orders the spirit to be quiet and drives the unclean spirit out of the man. Jesus' ability to heal those possessed by demons is an indication of his power over evil.

In the prescientific age of Jesus' time, all illnesses were understood to be manifestations of evil and sinfulness. Our modern understanding of illness is very different.

Possession by unclean spirits may have been a way to describe what we might call mental illness today. It may have even been a way of describing certain kinds of physical conditions. There is evidence that there were many kinds of exorcists and healers in first-century Palestine.

Jesus appears to be like these healers, but he heals with unique authority and connects his healing activities with the words of his preaching.

We are missing the point that Mark is trying to make in this Gospel, however, if we try to explain away the healing work of Jesus. The crowds see in Jesus' cure of the possessed man further affirmation of his authority. Jesus' power to heal gives greater credence to his teaching. Jesus impresses the crowds through his words, which are manifested with power in his deeds. Mark's Gospel tells us that because of the authority with which he healed, Jesus' fame spread throughout all of Galilee.

JESUS, OUR DIVINE TEACHER

Teachers are powerful because they change lives. They have within their grasp the power over young lives to hurt them terribly or heal them wonderfully. Most of us are deeply and forever indebted to some caring teacher in our past. Some people never get over the damage done to them by some cruel or uncaring teacher. So today, when we hear that Jesus entered the synagogue at Capernaum and began to teach, we need to take note: Jesus was a teacher. They never called him "Reverend," or "Father," or "Priest." They called him "Rabbi," which means "teacher." Let us all become good teachers and use our authority to mold young lives in the right way.

YOU MAY HAVE A SEXUAL ABUSE CLAIM OR OTHER CLAIM AGAINST THE ARCHDIOCESE OF SAN FRANCISCO

On August 21, 2023, The Roman Catholic Archbishop of San Francisco, a California corporation sole, aka Archdiocese of San Francisco (the "<u>Debtor</u>"), filed for protection under chapter 11 of title 11 of the United States Code (the "<u>Bankruptcy Code</u>")

If you were sexually abused by any person connected with the Debtor, you must file a claim so as to be received by February 20, 2024, or otherwise you will be forever barred, estopped, and enjoined from asserting such claim against the Debtor.

Claims based on acts or omissions of the Debtor that occurred before August 21, 2023, must be filed on or before February 20, 2024, even if such claims are not now fixed, liquidated, or certain or did not mature or become fixed, liquidated, or certain before August 21, 2023.

Leslie Weatherhead once told a parable of a little boy who fled from a witch who had turned herself into a cat. As the boy ran, he kept glancing fearfully over his shoulder. The first time he looked back, the cat was the size of a calf. The next time he looked, it had grown to the di-



mensions of an elephant. Then the boy fell, and was unable to go farther. Resolutely he got up and faced the pursuing horror. It stopped. So he took a step toward it. It backed away. As he continued to advance toward it, it began to shrink in size as it retreated from him. Finally it changed into a mouse and ran under the door of the witch's cottage to be seen no more.

The moral is clear: it pays to face up to your fears. But sometimes that is hard to do. That is when we need to turn to Christ. He can help us stand up to our fears and conquer them. He can cast out demons. - adapted from Leslie Weatherhead

My BEST DEMONS

Kathleen Norris writes, "When I think of the demons I need to exorcise, I have to look inward, to my heart and soul. Anger is my best demon, useful whenever I have to go into a Woman Warrior mode, harmful when I use it to gratify myself, either in self-justification, or to deny my



fears. My husband, who has a much sweeter nature than I, once told me that my mean streak grieved him, not just because of the pain it cause him but because it was doing me harm. His remark, as wise as that of any desert Abba, felt like an exorcism. Not that my temptation to anger was magically gone, but I was called to pay closer attention to something that badly needed attention, and that was hurting our marriage. It confirmed my understanding of marriage as a holy act: one can no more hide one's true faults from a spouse than from God, and in exorcising the demon of anger, that which could kill is converted, transformed into that which can heal."

What are your best demons? To name them for what they are and how they bring suffering, is half the battle.
