

FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Job 7:1-4, 6-7; Psalm 147; 1 Corinthians 9:16-19; Mark 1:29-39

It is interesting to notice where Jesus encounters people. We might think that Jesus, son of God and Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, would live in the Temple and allow people to come and worship him. But time and again in the Gospels we see Jesus going out to encounter people no matter where they are. Jesus meets the Samaritan woman at a well, he meets the good thief on the cross, and in today's Gospel, Jesus leaves the synagogue and enters the house of Simon's mother-in-law where he encounters her.



When we encounter Jesus, we should not leave unchanged. He brings healing to our bodies and our souls, if we have faith and trust in him. In today's Gospel, Jesus heals Simon's mother-in-law; he also cures many who were sick and drove out many demons. Jesus desires to heal us and make us whole. But this does not come without a cost.

Jesus heals us and sets us free not so that we can simply live life "our way," but so we can build the kingdom of God by spreading the Christian message. Each of us as a Christian is called to say with Saint Paul: Woe to me if I do not preach [the Gospel]! All of us are given this mission, we simply need to discover in what way God is calling us to accomplish it. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, we have access to the graces and gifts necessary to live out this call.

At times, the way we are to live out the mission Jesus gives us is simply to be a good mother or father, a loving and devoted wife or husband, a faithful friend. There will be other times when Jesus wants us to preach the truth of the Gospel in a literal way to those who have never heard of him. There will be times when our mission is to preach through our actions and lifestyle. We heard in today's Gospel that everyone was looking for Jesus. How can we help them find him?

Each one of us has been called by name. We have already encountered Jesus in the sacraments, and have been healed of the stain of our original sin. Now God calls us forth to proclaim this Good News to all. Let us undertake our mission with joy and gladness.

February 9, Our Saint of the Week: Saint Miguel Febres Cordero



How would you like to have a teacher who was described like this: He was kind to everyone and treated all of his students, rich or poor, the same. He liked to be with the students, and they liked to be with him. All of the children in the school loved him. That is exactly what a saint said about today's saint.

Miguel was born in Ecuador where his family was influential in politics. As a child, he suffered from a disability that kept him from standing and walking like other children. He could not

stand alone until he was five years old, when it was said he experienced a vision of Our Lady. Miguel was educated at home until he was 14, then went to school taught by the Christian Brothers. He was a gifted student, and when he was only 17, he published the first of many books, a textbook on Spanish grammar.

Miguel joined the Christian Brothers, and was a teacher for 32 years in Ecuador. As a teacher he was always looking for new ways to present the material. He wanted to make the lessons and work more pleasant for students. He laughed with his students and was understanding and patient.

Brother Miguel continued writing, and his scholarly works in literature earned him academic honors in South America and Europe. But Brother Miguel did not think he was very important. He thought the most important ones were his students.

In 1907, Miguel was called to the Motherhouse in Belgium to translate some books. On the way he stopped for a short visit in New York City. From Belgium he went to a school in Spain where young men were preparing to become Christian Brothers. In 1909, during the Spanish Revolution, the school came under attack. Brother Miguel took the Blessed Sacrament from the chapel and led the novices across the bay to safety in Barcelona. He died of pneumonia a year later. He is laid to rest in Ecuador and the people welcomed him with a great procession through the streets of Quito, Ecuador.

Additional Thoughts on Today's Gospel

We need to be instruments for the exercise of Jesus' **healing power.** Bringing *healing and wholeness* is Jesus' ministry even today, He continues it through the Church and through the Christians. In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, the Church prays for spiritual and physical healing, forgiveness of sins, and comfort for those who are suffering from illness. We all need the healing of our minds, our memories and our broken relationships. Jesus now uses counselors, doctors, friends or even strangers in His healing ministry. Let us look at today's Gospel and identify with the mother-in-law of Peter. Let us ask for the ordinary healing we need in our own lives. When we are healed, let us not forget to thank Jesus for his goodness, mercy, and compassion toward us by our own turning to serve others. Our own healing process is completed only when we are ready to help others in their needs and to focus on things outside ourselves. Let us also be instruments for the exercise of Jesus' healing power by visiting the sick and praying for their healing. But let us remember that we need the Lord's strength, not only to make ourselves and others well, but to make ourselves and others whole.

We need to live for others as Jesus did: Jesus was a man for others, sharing what he had with others. In his life there was time for prayer, time for healing and time for reconciliation. Let us take up this challenge by sharing love, mercy, compassion and forgiveness with others. Instead of considering life as dull and boring let us live our lives as Jesus did, full of dynamism and zeal for the glory of God.

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today we continue to read from Mark's Gospel, learning more about the ministry of Jesus, Jesus cured Simon's mother-in-law, and she immediately began to serve Jesus and his disciples. Jesus also cured many others who were brought to him, healing their illnesses and driving out demons. As we will see throughout Mark's Gospel, Jesus did not permit the demons to speak because they knew his identity



and would have revealed it to those who were present.

On the morning after this busy day, Jesus retreated in prayer, but was pursued by Simon and others who brought news that many people were looking for him. At this point in Mark's Gospel, we begin to see a distinct role for the inner circle of Jesus' disciples—they act as intermediaries between Jesus and the people. Jesus reports to his disciples that they need to leave Capernaum to preach in other places.

Today's Gospel completes a picture of Jesus' ministry: preaching, curing the sick, driving out demons, and then moving on to continue this work in another place. Mark's Gospel tells us that Jesus did this throughout Galilee.


Jesus' compassion and healing of the sick is a sign of the Kingdom of God. The Church continues to extend Christ's healing presence to others in its ministry to the sick. In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, the Church prays for spiritual and physical healing, forgiveness of sins, and comfort for those who are suffering from illness.

In today's Gospel we also notice the importance of prayer in Jesus' daily life. Jesus rose early in the morning, removed himself from the crowds, and went to a deserted place to pray. When the disciples found him, he told them that it was time to move on. We believe that in his prayers Jesus found guidance and direction from God. We also bring our decision-making to God in prayer, asking for his guidance and direction in our lives.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION



We're reading St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians these days. What was Corinth like? It had a beautiful setting on an isthmus, about fifty miles from Athens. The location makes for very easy exchange by sea routes between

Greece and Italy, a factor in its economic success even today. In Paul's day it was a cosmopolitan and wealthy city with inhabitants drawn from all over the world, including a sizeable Jewish community. When Paul arrived about the year 50, the city was only about a century old, but already five times the size of Athens. Paul lived in Corinth for a year and a half, and a few years later came back for three months. The community of Christians there struggled against the influence of a very secular and self-indulgent society that was blind to the plight of the poor. Pagan attitudes afflicted the community, which had a way of breaking Paul's heart; he wrote to them sometimes "with many tears" (2 Corinthians 2:4).

Today, Corinth is a small industrial city. Its historic core has been destroyed by a series of earthquakes over the centuries, and what little remained was totally obliterated in a war with Turkey in the 1820s. There's a core city with glamorous



shops to catch the tourists, but it is mainly a cargo port, with piles of marble, tiles, and minerals everywhere, a huge oil refinery nearby, a busy canal, a modern fast rail line to Athens, and a meeting point of major highways. Today, the remains of the Temple of Apollo and the marketplace are more ruined than most such sites. The glory of the city Paul knew well has faded, but the relevance of his words shines through the centuries.
