Fifth Sunday in Lent

First Reading (Jeremiah 31:31-34); (**Psalm** 51 or 130); **Second Reading** (Hebrews 5:7-9) ; **Gospel** (John 12:20-33) or John 11:1-45 [3-7, 17, 20]

In today's Gospel we encounter Jesus in Jerusalem. He knows that *the hour* is at hand, when he will drive out *the ruler of this world*, the devil.

Jesus knows he is about to die and he knows how it is going to happen, as he refers to being *lifted up. I will draw everyone to myself*, he says, a fitting reminder to us that he does not give his life only for the sins of a few, but so that all may be forgiven and redeemed. Jesus chooses to become that grain of wheat that falls to the ground and dies that it may produce the fruit of salvation for all who believe. He tells us that if we are to serve him, then we must follow him, taking up our crosses and joining him at Calvary – that one day, we all may share in his victory.

In our baptism, we, too, are like a grain of wheat: dying to sin, that we may come alive in Christ Jesus. As the Letter to the Hebrews tells us, on the cross Jesus *became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him*. The Lord teaches us about the cost of discipleship. Jesus held nothing back in obtaining salvation for us by defeating our greatest enemies of sin, Satan, and death. We are called, likewise, to make an investment in our salvation, to be willing to work for it and suffer for it just as he did.

On the cross, Jesus fulfills the new covenant called for by Jeremiah in today's first reading. No longer will God's law be carved in stone. Instead, in Christ, God's law is written on the human heart with the blood of Jesus. *I will be their God, and they shall be my people*, Jeremiah says, prophesying a new beginning and a fresh start for God's people: *I will forgive their evildoing and remember their sin no more*. As God is so willing to freely and frequently overlook the wrongs we have done, so are we commanded to do the same.

As our Lenten journey inches closer to the events of Palm Sunday and Holy Week, we turn our focus to Jesus as he approaches "his hour" on the lonesome road to Calvary. As Jesus *offered prayers and supplications with loud cries and tears* for us and for our salvation, so, too, we join our pains and sufferings with his. We bring him our fears, faults, and failings, even our lack of forgiveness, that all might be washed away by the holy water and blood that flows from his side on the cross.

As we get closer to our Easter salvation, may the love of Jesus fill your heart each day.

St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary

It was on December 8, 1870, Pope Pius IX declared St. Joseph as the patron of the Universal Church. To mark the 150th anniversary of this declaration, Pope Francis announced the Year of St. Joseph with the Apostolic Letter Patris Corde (With a Father's Heart) on December 8, 2020. The Year began on December 8, 2020 and concluded on December 8, 2021. Pope Francis established the year so that "every member of the faithful, following his example, may strengthen their life of faith daily in the complete fulfillment of God's will."

Pope Francis wrote Patris Corde to share his personal reflections on St. Joseph in the backdrop of the Coronavirus pandemic which shows "how our lives are woven together and sustained by ordinary people, people often overlooked" like St. Joseph." Pope Francis writes, "Each of us can discover in St. Joseph – the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence – an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble. St. Joseph reminds us that those who appear hidden or in the shadows can play an incomparable role in the history of salvation." Pope Francis wrote this

Apostolic Letter also to highlight the role of St. Joseph as a father who served his family with charity and humility. Saying that "our world today needs fathers," he presents St. Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father, a creatively courageous father, a working father, and a father in the shadows.

"The aim of this Apostolic Letter," Pope Francis says, "is to increase our love for this great saint, to encourage us to implore his intercession and to imitate his virtues and his zeal." He says that "the proper mission of the saints is not only to obtain miracles and graces, but to intercede for us before God, like Abraham and Moses, and like Jesus, the one mediator (1 Timothy 2:5) who is our 'advocate' with the Father (John 2:1) and who 'always lives to make intercession for us' (Hebrews 7:2- 5)." As Pope Francis has reminded us, let us try to grow in our devotion to St. Joseph. Every year the month of March is dedicated to St. Joseph.



Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's Gospel reading is taken from the Gospel of John. We are reading much further into John's Gospel than we have for the past two weeks. Chapter 12 of John's Gospel is a preparation for the beginning of the passion narrative to follow. Jesus has just raised Lazarus from the dead—an important sign in John's Gospel, which inspired many people to believe in Jesus. This event also marks the turning point in Jesus' conflict with the Jewish authorities. John's Gospel tells us that the Sanhedrin met after this event and made plans to kill Jesus. In the 12th chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus is anointed at Bethany and enters Jerusalem in triumph. We again see evidence of the significance of the raising of Lazarus to this event; John reports that the crowds also gathered to see Lazarus. Following his triumphant entry into Jerusalem, Jesus predicted his suffering, death, and Resurrection and prepared his disciples to believe in the salvation that his death would accomplish. Using the metaphor of the grain of wheat, Jesus presented the idea that his dying would be beneficial. He also taught that those who would be his disciples must follow his example of sacrifice. This theme will be repeated in John's account of the Last Supper, when Jesus washed the feet of his disciples as an example of how they must serve one another.

The final section of today's Gospel might be read as John's parallel to the agony in the garden. Unlike the Synoptic Gospels, the Gospel of John does not record Jesus' anguished prayer in the garden of Gethsemane before his arrest. Although comparable words are found in today's reading, Jesus gives a confident response to the question he raises when asking God to save him from his impending death. After announcing his conviction that it is for this purpose that he came, a voice from heaven speaks, as if in answer to Jesus' prayer. This voice, like the one heard at Jesus' baptism and at Jesus' Transfiguration—events reported in the Synoptic Gospels but not in John's Gospel—affirms that God welcomes the sacrifice that Jesus will make on behalf of others. In John's Gospel, Jesus teaches that this voice was sent for the sake of those who would believe in him. In today's Gospel, we also hear Jesus speak about the cosmic framework against which we are to understand his passion, death, and Resurrection. Through his death and Resurrection, Jesus conquered Satan, the ruler of this world. In this way the world is judged, but the judgment is not condemnation. Instead, through Jesus' dying and rising, salvation is brought to the world.


