

A Message from our Pastor





Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

It is good to be back with you this weekend from the National Eucharistic Congress. You may have seen some photos and videos of the event, online or in print. There has been information going out through Archdiocesan media channels and I am sure that there will be stories in an upcoming edition of *Catholic San Francisco*. Ironically, I was not able to connect with our seminarian Derek who was one of the Perpetual Pilgrims for the Revival/Congress. However, it can be difficult to connect with someone when there are more than 50,000 people walking around a convention center. Last week, I said I would share some thoughts from the Congress but as I write this, I need a bit more time to unpack the experience. One advance thought, God was present.

Now I will conclude my autobiography for you...After ordination to the Priesthood in June 2010, I was first assigned to Mater Dolorosa Church in South San Francisco for the summer. After that summer, I returned to Rome to complete my STL degree (equivalent of a master's degree) in theology. In July 2021, I returned to the Archdiocese and was named the parochial vicar (assistant priest) at Saint Gregory's Parish in San Mateo. I was there for two years and was then named the Vocation Director for the Archdiocese of San Francisco, a position I held from 2013-2017. During my time as Vocation Director, I was in residence at Saint Paul's Parish in Noe Valley and then Saint Gabriel's Parish in the Outer Sunset. In the fall of 2017, I joined the formation team of the Pontifical North American College (NAC) in Rome, Italy. For the first three years I held the title of Assistant Vice Rector and then for the last three years, Vice Rector. Besides various administrative duties, my most important work was as a Formation Advisor. This meant I had a group of students who I met with individually on a monthly basis and we discussed their formation and preparation for the

priesthood. For example, we might talk about what happened during the apostolic works, how their practice homilies were received, and how their studies were developing. This was the best part of my work. It was truly a privilege to work with good men who were striving for holiness and looking to follow the will of God in their lives. One of the highlights of being in Rome again, besides eating pasta almost every day, was meeting the Holy Father, Pope Francis on three occasions. It was during my ministry in Rome when I began to get to know the Saint Stephen's community in a more concrete way as this was where I would spend much of my Christmas and summer breaks from the seminary.

When my assignment in Rome concluded in June 2023, I returned to the States but was given the opportunity to make the 30day Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius of Loyola. This particular retreat format was developed Saint Ignatius to lead the retreatant to help her/him discern the will of God in their life and draw the person into a closer relationship with Jesus Christ. For me, it was a very privileged time to spend with the Lord and a time for which I will always be grateful. After the retreat, I began my parish assignment as the Administrator of Saint Monica – Saint Thomas the Apostle in the Richmond District. It was a tremendous experience with the opportunity to minister with and to wonderful people. Now after a year there, the Archbishop assigned me to be the Pastor of Saint Stephen's so Father Liliedahl may focus on building up the campus ministry to the students of SF State. He will continue his relationship with the parish as a Parochial Vicar (assistant), but the bulk of his time will be spent in campus ministry. Now that you know more or less my background, we now have the opportunity to one another in person. I look forward to getting to know all of you equally well. *Father Schunk*




DOG DAYS OF SUMMER

Background on the Gospel Reading

Gospel Reading John 6:1-15

Through most of Lectionary Cycle B, our Sunday Gospel readings are taken from the Gospel of Mark. Over the past two Sundays, we heard how Jesus sent his disciples to share in his mission. If we were to continue reading Mark's Gospel, we would next hear his report of how Jesus feeds the crowds in the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. Our Lectionary, however, leaves Mark's Gospel for the next several weeks and instead presents this event from the Gospel of John. In John's Gospel, Jesus' multiplication of the loaves and the fishes is presented as a sign of his authority and divinity. Jesus interprets the meaning and significance of this miracle as a sharing of his Body and Blood. This chapter is sometimes called the "Bread of Life Discourse."

In many important ways, John's Gospel uses the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes to teach about the Eucharist. Like the Last Supper, this miracle is said to have occurred near the time of the Jewish feast of Passover. (In John's Gospel three Passovers are identified.) Jesus' language is similar to the language he used at the Last Supper as reported in the Synoptic Gospels. John's description of this event also anticipates the Messianic banquet of heaven, as the crowd reclines and all hungers are satisfied with abundance. This connection is further amplified by the response of the crowd, who wants to make Jesus a king. John is teaching us that each time we celebrate the Eucharist, we are anticipating the eternal banquet of heaven.

Recall that John's Gospel tells the story of the Last Supper differently than the Synoptic Gospels. Instead of describing the meal and Jesus' actions with the bread and cup, John describes how Jesus washed his disciples' feet. We hear this Gospel when we remember the Last Supper on Holy Thursday. This recollection of Jesus' action at the Last Supper complements the institution narrative of the Synoptic Gospels and Paul's Letters that we hear repeated at each Mass.

In both stories about the Eucharist—the washing of the disciples' feet and the multiplication of the loaves and the fishes—the Gospel of John teaches us that the Eucharist is an action. Our word Eucharist is taken from the Greek language and describes an action: "to give thanks." In the Eucharist we are fed by Jesus himself, and we are sent to serve others.

John's Gospel notes the detail that the bread blessed and shared with the crowd are barley loaves. This is the food of the poor. It reminds us that God feeds and nourishes us, fulfilling our physical needs as well as our spiritual ones. In the Eucharist, we are sent to serve the poorest among us.

The story of the multiplication of the loaves and the fishes recalls a particular aspect of the Mass. In this miracle, Jesus transforms a young boy's offering of five barley loaves and two fish. In the offertory at Mass, we present the fruits of our labors, represented by bread and wine. These gifts, given to us first by God as grain and fruit, are returned to God in our offering of thanksgiving. God in turn transforms our gifts, making this bread and wine the very Body and Blood of Jesus. We also offer ourselves in this exchange, and we, too, are transformed by the Eucharist.


Our Humor for the Week

Our Saint of the Week: Saint John Vianney

Feast day - August 4



In 1805, John Vianney entered a seminary at age 19. After several months of study, he was still not prepared to attend lectures in Latin. He went to live with a friend who was a priest and who tutored him. This priest persuaded the bishop to ordain John not for his learning but for his holiness. After a few years, John was assigned to Ars, a village of about 50 families in France. The people

were careless about practicing their faith, so they were not happy with this priest who was eager to draw them back to God and Christian living. Some caused trouble by lying about John, by acting violently against him, and by refusing to cooperate with him. They hoped that he would give up and leave. Instead, Father Vianney increased his prayers, fasting, and penances.

Gradually, people came to celebrate the sacraments and listen to his homilies. Within a few years, Father Vianney was spending 10–15 hours a day in the confessional. People from all over France and other countries came to consult him. The government built a railroad line to Ars to accommodate all the pilgrims. Father Vianney just continued his hard, yet simple, way of prayer, fasting, and penance. He was strict with his parishioners but a hundred times more strict with himself. John gave away his furnishings, his belongings, and the gifts of clothes and food that the neighbors brought him. Once he received a black velvet cape as an award and sold it to buy food for those who were poor. He died at age 73. John was canonized in 1925 and is the patron of parish priests.

National Eucharistic Pilgrimage

A Note from Seminarian Dereck Delgado:

We have had between 55,000-65,000 faithful join us at the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis. The energy was incredible and the zeal for a Eucharistic Revival was evident. Our Lord has certainly moved many hearts to become Eucharistic Missionaries in their home



dioceses—individuals who will spread their enthusiasm for the Eucharist at home. There is certainly a sense of renewal coming to the Church, or a new Pentecost as the bishops call it. Exteriorly, we might see this in the form of more Eucharistic Processions or a greater sense of reverence of receiving the Eucharist. Interiorly, we hope to see hearts changed as a result of knowing Jesus and imitating Him more fully. The work is just beginning for this renewal and this Congress is meant to be a kickstart for that new Pentecost we are praying for! The National Eucharistic Congress has ended . . . but the movement is not over. We can't wait to see what God has in store for the third year of the Revival—our Year of Mission! Come, Holy Spirit!
