

August 27, 2023 Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time



Jesus went into the region of Caesarea Philippi and he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?"

They replied, "Some say John the Baptist, others Elijah, still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets."

He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?"

Simon Peter said in reply, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God."

Jesus said to him in reply, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father.

"And so I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven.

"Whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

Then he strictly ordered his disciples to tell no one that he was the Christ.

Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time Isaiah 22;19-23; Psalm 138; Romans 11:33-36; Matthew 16:30-20

In this week's Gospel reading from Matthew 16:13-20, we are presented with a profound exchange between Jesus and his disciples, one that lays the foundation for the Church's identity and mission. As Jesus and his followers journey to the region of Caesarea Philippi, he poses a pivotal question to his disciples: "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" This question prompts reflection on the various perceptions people hold about Jesus' identity. The disciples respond with the opinions circulating among the people, highlighting the diversity of interpretations.

Jesus then directs their attention to the heart of the matter, asking them directly, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter's response is an inspired declaration of faith: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." This confession becomes the bedrock upon which Jesus establishes his Church, and he names Peter as the "rock" upon which he will build his community. This passage underscores the significance of recognizing and affirming Jesus' true identity as the Son of God, and it emphasizes the pivotal role of Peter as a foundational figure within the Church.

Lesson: Embracing Our Identity and Mission

The Gospel reading invites us to reflect on our own understanding of Jesus' identity. Like the disciples, we are confronted with diverse interpretations of Christ in our modern world. As Catholics, we are called to emulate Peter's unwavering faith, acknowledging Jesus as the true Christ and Son of God. Just as Peter received the keys to the Kingdom of Heaven, we are entrusted with upholding the teachings of Christ and preserving the faith passed down through generations. This entails embracing our identity as members of Christ's Church and fulfilling our mission to spread His message of love, redemption, and salvation to all corners of the world.



Saint Exemplar: St. Athanasius – Defender of Catholic Teaching

This week, we draw inspiration from Saint Athanasius, a champion of the Catholic faith during a time of great theological turmoil. St. Athanasius ardently defended the divinity of Christ and the concept of the Holy Trinity against the Arian heresy. Despite facing exile and persecution, he fearlessly stood up for the truth, demonstrating an unwavering commitment to preserving the authentic teachings of the Church. St. Athanasius' steadfastness and dedication to orthodoxy serve as a model for us to remain resolute in our beliefs, even when faced with adversity.

PEOPLE SEE THINGS DIFFERENTLY

People see things differently all the time. For example, three people - a minister, an archaeologist, and a cowboy were getting their first look at the Grand Canyon one day. The minister exclaimed, "Truly this is one of the glories of God!" The archaeologist commented, "What a wonder of nature this is!" And the cowboy said, "Can you imagine trying to find a lost steer in there?" People see things differently.

The Messianic hope of those in the Jewish community who held such a belief was that the Chosen One would reestablish the supremacy of Israel among the great nations of the world. The assumption was that this would be accomplished in a violent and vengeful manner, with the forceful overthrow and total destruction of the current ruling powers. But before this happened, the prophet Elijah would return to herald the coming of the Chosen One. As a result of these hopes, Jesus had to somehow communicate to his disciples and others who had such high hopes for him that what he was offering was something completely different from what they expected.

WITHOUT THE STRUGGLE, THERE ARE NO WINGS

A family brought in two cocoons that were about to hatch. They watched as the first one began to open and the butterfly inside squeezed very slowly and painfully through a tiny hole that it chewed in one end of the cocoon. After lying exhausted for about ten minutes following its agonizing emergence, the butterfly finally flew out the open window on its beautiful new wings.

The family decided to help the second butterfly so that it would not have to go through such an excruciating ordeal. So, as it began to emerge, they carefully sliced open the cocoon with a razor blade, doing the equivalent of a Caesarean section. The second butterfly never did sprout wings, and in about ten minutes, instead of flying away, it quietly died.

The family asked a biologist friend to explain what had happened. The scientist said that the difficult struggle to emerge from the small hole actually pushes liquids from deep inside the butterfly's body cavity into tiny capillaries in the wings where they hardened to complete the healthy and beautiful adult butterfly. THE IMITATION OF CHRIST

St. Stephen Catholic Book Club

Our Book Club is open to anyone interested in reading and discussing books with inherent or implied Christian themes. We will meet 10:00 am Aug. 12, in the Conference Room at the parish offices. Contact Mary Molly for more information.

This month we are reading: *The Imitation of Christ*, by Thomas à Kempis, which is a Christian devotional book written in the 1400's. The text is divided into four books of detailed spiritual instructions: (1) "Helpful Counsels of the Spiritual Life", (2) "Directives for the Interior Life", (3) "On Interior Consolation", and (4) "On the Blessed Sacrament". The devotions of the books emphasize devotion to the Eucharist as the key element of spiritual life.

The Imitation of Christ is a handbook for the spiritual life and is perhaps the most widely read Christian devotional work after the Bible, and is regarded as a devotional and religious classic. The book's popularity was immediate when it was first printed and went on to be printed in many editions through the centuries. Apart from the Bible, no book had been translated into more languages than *The Imitation of Christ*.
