Fourth Sunday of Advent

First Reading (2 Samuel 7:1-5, 8b-12). Psalm (Psalm 89). Second Reading (Romans 16:25-27). Gospel (Luke 1:26-38).

This Sunday we read the story of the angel Gabriel's announcement to Mary about the birth of Jesus. This story is found only in Luke's Gospel. On this fourth Sunday of Advent, the liturgy shifts our attention from John the Baptist to Mary, the mother of Jesus. Both John and Mary serve as important figures for our reflection during the season of Advent; they both played instrumental roles in preparing the way for Jesus. Last week we reflected on John the Baptist's announcement that the Savior was among us, although not yet recognized. This week we reflect upon Mary's example of faith and obedience to God, traits which permitted her to receive the angel's message that God's Son would be born as a human person, as one of us.



We are familiar with the story of the Annunciation, and it is fitting that we recall how God announced the birth of Jesus as we make our final preparations for our celebration of the Incarnation. The angel Gabriel visited Mary, a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph. Mary greeted the angel's news with awe and wonder and asked how it could be possible that she could give birth to a child. In his reply, the angel Gabriel announced the seemingly impossible reality: the child to be born would be conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and would be God's own Son. The angel reported to Mary another miracle; her relative Elizabeth was also pregnant despite having been thought to be unable to have a child. Mary's response to the angel, which is called her *fiat*, is an example of complete faith and obedience to God.



The story of the Annunciation calls to our attention God's wondrous action in human history. God chose a human person to give birth to his Son so that all humanity would know God's salvation. Mary, already full of God's grace, was able to cooperate in this great plan for our salvation. Thus Jesus was born as one of us, fully human and also fully divine. This is the mystery we prepare to celebrate at Christmas, the mystery of the Incarnation. In the model of Mary, we pray that we will be people of faith who recognize God's saving plan for us and are able respond with obedience.

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Our Saint of the Week *December 26, 2023* - St. Stephen

One of the first deacons of the Church was a man named Stephen, a man filled with the Holy Spirit and with faith. Besides his job of overseeing the distribution of the poor, he also preached. A group of Jewish Hellenists strongly resented Stephen's preaching of salvation through Jesus. The situation became so tense that they found witnesses to falsely testify that Stephen had committed blasphemy. Stephen was arrested and brought to the court. The odds were against him and Jesus said, "When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say; for what you are to say will be given to you in that hour; for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your father speaking through you (Mathew 10:19–20). Stephen knew he would be helped by the Holy Spirit, and he wasn't afraid.

When Stephen testified in court, he made two major points. First he believed that God could be found everywhere, not just in a single place like temple or a single person like Abraham. Second he demonstrated how from the beginning, the Israelites had consistently rejected God's messengers, prophet's, and chosen servants. And now they rejected and killed God's Son who had been sent to them.

Those who had been listening to Stephen were blinded by anger so strong that they didn't even wait for normal court proceedings. They rushed toward him, dragged him out of town, and stoned him. Stephen was the first person killed for Christ. His last words were "Lord, do not hold this sin against them" (*Acts 7:60*).

SOME "THOUGHTS ABOUT "XMAS"

<u>What did the first</u> <u>Christians call what we</u> today know as Christmas?

Merry Christmas

The first Christians do not appear to have had a word for this day, because the first

Christians do not appear to have celebrated this day. It took some time for the practice of celebrating Christmas to emerge.

Benedict XVI explained:

The Church's year of feasts first developed, not with a view to the birth of Christ, but from faith in his Resurrection. Thus the original feast of Christianity is Easter, not Christmas. For indeed it was the Resurrection that established Christian faith and let the Church come to be. For this reason, Ignatius of Antioch (who died at the latest in A.D. 117) already called Christians those "who no longer keep the Sabbath but rather live according to the Lord's Day." Being a Christian means living from Easter, that is, from the Resurrection that is celebrated every week on Sunday. It was Hippolytus who first established with certainty, in his commentary on Daniel, written about A.D. 204, that Jesus was born on December 25. . . . Be that as it may, the feast of Christmas did not assume clear contours in Christendom until the fourth century *(Images of Hope, ch. 1)*.

Inspiration for the Season Saint Joseph

If anyone had to rely on a feeling that things will turn out for the best, it was Saint Joseph. He took in Mary, risking his reputation and

in Mary, risking his reputation and accepting a responsibility that he at first didn't understand. But he had hope and faith, and he forged on to serve as the father and protection of the Savior.

Saint Joseph's trust was called upon again when Jesus was a baby. An angel appeared to Saint Joseph in a dream and told him to take Mary and Jesus to Egypt to escape King Herod, who was seeking to kill the newborn king (Mt 2:13 -18). Joseph didn't call up his friends in Jerusalem to confirm or Google places to stay in Egypt. He fled with faith, believing that what he desired – safety for his family – would be fulfilled. Like Saint Joseph, we can proceed with the quiet confidence that Saint Joseph exhibited so well in such a tremendous role.

Advent Meditation

Prayer at home:

Loving God, we open ourselves to you, trusting you created us for joy-filled hearts and lives. Show us the creative power of hope. Teach us the peace that comes from justice. Fill us with the kind of joy that cannot be contained within, but must be shared. Prepare our hearts to be transformed by you. That we may walk in the light of Christ. Amen.

On August 21, 2023, The Roman Catholic Archbishop of San Francisco, a California corporation sole, aka Archdiocese of San Francisco (the "<u>Debtor</u>"), filed for protection under chapter 11 of title 11 of the United States Code (the "<u>Bankruptcy Code</u>")

If you were sexually abused by any person connected with the Debtor, you must file a claim so as to be received by February 20, 2024, or otherwise you will be forever barred, estopped, and enjoined from asserting such claim against the Debtor.

Claims based on acts or omissions of the Debtor that occurred before August 21, 2023, must be filed on or before February 20, 2024, even if such claims are not now fixed, liquidated, or certain or did not mature or become fixed, liquidated, or certain before August 21, 2023.

Christmas Mass Obligations Clarified

With Christmas Day on a Monday this year, many people want their Mass obligations clarified. The short answer is: Yes, there is a Sunday obligation and a separate Holy Day obligation. On Sunday, December 24, which is the Fourth Sunday of Advent, Masses **after 4:00 pm** should be the Vigil Mass for the Nativity of the Lord and not the Mass for the Fourth Sunday of Advent.



If your parish has a regularly scheduled Sunday evening Mass, the Vigil Mass for the Nativity is to be used. Obligation to Attend Mass: This year we have the unusual occurrence of the obligation to attend Mass on two consecutive days. People ask: 'Can I satisfy two obligations with one Mass?' The U.S. Catholic Bishops have clarified that "When consecutive obligations occur on Saturday-Sunday or Sunday-Monday, the faithful must attend Mass twice to fulfill two separate obligations." Therefore, the people are obliged to attend one Mass for the Fourth Sunday of Advent (from Saturday evening 12./23 up to 4:00 pm on Sunday 12/24); and one Mass for the celebration of the Nativity of the Lord (from 4:00 pm on Sunday 12/24 through all Masses on Monday 12/25).

SOME THOUGHTS ABOUT "XMAS"

Is writing "Xmas" okay?

Yes, it is "okay" to write "Xmas." It's just an abbreviation, and there is nothing sinful about abbreviating a word, even one containing the term "Christ." In fact, the earliest Christians *did* frequently abbreviate sacred terms. Scholars studying early Christian manuscripts are familiar with a phenomenon known as the <u>nomina</u> <u>sacra</u> ("sacred names"; singular =



nomen sacrum) in which terms like "God," "Jesus," "Lord," and "Christ" were regularly abbreviated precisely because they were sacred. This happens in our earliest manuscripts of the New Testament documents. Thus, "God" (Greek, theos) was abbreviated with a theta and a sigma (its first and last letters in Greek), "Jesus" (Iesous) was abbreviated iota-sigma, "Lord" (Kurios) was abbreviated kappa-sigma, and "Christ" (Christos) was abbreviated chi-sigma. The appearance of the nomina sacra is one of the ways that we date when a Christian manuscript was written, because this practice characterized the early centuries.

Similar abbreviations have appeared later, though. Concerning "Xmas," the Online Etymology Dictionary says: Xmas (n) = "Christmas," 1551, X'temmas, wherein the X is an abbreviation for Christ in Christmas, English letter X being identical in form (but not sound signification) to Greek chi, the first letter of Greek Christos "Christ" (see Christ). The earlier way to abbreviate the word in English was Xp- or Xr- (corresponding to the "Chr-" in Greek Xριστος), and the form Xres mæsse for "Christmas" appears in the "Anglo-Saxon Chronicle" (c.1100).
