Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This weekend, we begin the sacred season of Advent. We have included in the bulletin a brief reflection of this season from a former seminary professor and colleague of mine, Father Kurt Belsole, OSB, a Benedictine Monk of Saint Vincent's Archabbey in Latrobe, PA.

Corner This week, our second-grade students will celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time as they continue their preparations for the Sacrament of the Eucharist in the spring. Please keep them in your prayers as they and their families continue to grow closer to the Lord Jesus.

As I like to say, the Advent Giving Tree (or Advent Bulletin Board) is now in full giving-mode. Thank you very much for those of you who have participated already and for those of you who will be donating something in support of our charity this year, the Healing WELL.

I would like to call your attention to the announcement on the annual Winter Shelter Dinner in the bulletin. The Archdiocese of San Francisco has participated for years in the San Francisco Interfaith Council, a group that was formed by religious leaders in the City to help respond to the need for more shelters for the homeless. Our parish was asked to once again participate by preparing meals for guests on two evenings (Dec. 19 and Feb. 7) when the shelter is open for the winter. If you are available to assist and volunteer your time, please contact Mary Molly in the parish office.

Every year on December 8, the Church celebrates the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Patroness of the United States. When the date of the celebration falls on a Sunday, the liturgical celebration is moved to the following day, December 9, because we celebrate the Second Sunday of Advent. When this peculiarity happened in the past, that Monday was not observed as a Holy Day of Obligation. But recently, the question of whether it should be a Holy Day was posed to the Holy See (e.g. the Vatican) and they responded that yes, it is a Holy Day of Obligation. So, on Monday, December 9, we will have our regular holy day schedule of Masses at 8:00 AM, 11:00 AM (school Mass), and 6:30 PM.

OUR SAINT FOR THE WEEK: Saint John of Damascene Feast Day December 4

(late 600's—mid 700's) John grew up in the rich, luxurious court of the Muslim ruler of Damascus, where his father was a wealthy Christian court official. In order to make sure John had a solid Christian foundation, his father employed a brilliant Sicilian monk named Cosmos, who was a war captive, to teach John. Cosmos schooled the boy in science and theology, in the Greek and Arabic languages, and in the culture of Islam. Then John was ready to assume a high place in the government, which he did. But the spirit of



the Muslim rulers was turning against Christians, so John left his position in the government and became a monk in Jerusalem. The date of his death is uncertain. Some think he may have lived to be 104 years old.

We know about John's faith through his writings. In them John explained the mysteries of the Christian faith, such as the Trinity, the Incarnation, the Real Presence in the Eucharist, and Mary's Assumption. One book he wrote is an important source on the teachings of the Greek Fathers of the Church. John was also a poet and hymn writer. Some of his songs are summaries of the truths of faith.

Perhaps John is most famous for his opposition to the heresy of the Iconoclasts. The Iconoclasts claimed that is superstitious to have religious images. They wanted to destroy all religious icons, pictures, and statues. The Iconoclasts were supported by the Eastern Christian Emperor Leo III. John of Damascene defended the use of sacred images. He explained that the respect given to them is really given to the person they represent. If you look around an Orthodox Church today, you will see that John won the debate. For all of his efforts to defend the faith, John of Damascene was named a Doctor of the Church in 1890.

The Season of Advent

The season of Advent begins on the First Sunday of Advent and continues until Christmas. This season has a two-fold character. First of all, it is a time when we focus on waiting in joyful expectation for the second coming of the Lord at the end of time. For that reason, on the First Sunday of Advent, we hear in the gospels of the three-year cycle about staying awake for the coming of the Son of Man, about being watchful and alert since we do not know when he will come, and about the Son of Man coming with power and great glory.

As Advent progresses, however, the first coming of Christ becomes more prominent. He is the Son of God and the Son of Mary as well as the baby born in Bethlehem who will suffer, die, and rise again for our salvation. The Second Sunday of Advent, therefore, has John the Baptist crying out: Prepare the way of the Lord. The Third Sunday of Advent again features John the Baptist hearing about the miracles of Christ, instructing the people that there is one among them whose sandal strap he is not worthy to untie, and then teaching that there is someone mightier than he who is coming and who will baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire.

Then, at last, on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, we hear in the gospel of how the birth of Jesus Christ came about, of Mary saying to the Archangel Gabriel: Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord, and the exclamation of Elizabeth at the visitation: How is it that the mother of my Lord should come to me?

Background on the Gospel Reading

Luke 21:25-28,34-36

Today is the first Sunday of Advent, which is also the first Sunday of the new liturgical year. The Advent season includes the four Sundays that precede Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. The key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice.

In this new liturgical year, the Gospel of Luke will be the primary Gospel proclaimed (Lectionary Cycle C). Today's Gospel is taken from the last chapter before the passion narrative in which Jesus is teaching in the Temple. We hear Jesus speak to his disciples about the need for vigilance and prayer as they wait for the coming of the Son of Man in glory. This passage marks the conclusion of a lengthy dialogue in which Jesus predicts the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, warns about the persecution and tribulations to follow, and identifies the signs that will signal the coming of the Son of Man in glory.

The community for whom Luke wrote his Gospel may have believed that they were already experiencing some of the events Jesus described. Most scholars believe that Luke's Gospel was written after the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 A.D. At the time, many Christians interpreted this event as an indication that Jesus' second coming was near.

Though Jesus predicts a time of destruction and fear, Jesus indicates that others will be frightened; Jesus' disciples are not to fear, but are to stand tall. Yet Jesus does not promise deliverance from anxiety or tribulations. He encourages his disciples to pray for strength. The early Christian communities did not find consolation in the promise of a utopia, nor should we. Instead, we find in our Christian faith the means by which we witness to God's unfailing love for us in all circumstances.

Jesus' predictions about the end times may sound dire, but in the next paragraph Luke tells us that people woke early to listen to Jesus' teaching in the Temple area. In his person and in his message, those who heard Jesus found strength and consolation. Like the first Christians, we may encounter events and circumstances that could lead us to despair. Through prayer, however, we find strength and consolation in Jesus' words and in his continuing presence with us to endure all things and to witness to the action of God in our world.
