Third Sunday of Advent December 15, 2024



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Last Saturday, the Saint Stephen's Women's Guild held their annual gala fundraiser to raise money to support the programs of our parish school. It was an incredible evening as it showed the commitment of so many families with the sacrifice of their time and talents to put on a fabulous event. I want to personally acknowledge Jody Farrar and Vicky Kamahele, who were the cochairs of the event, along with the support of our principal Mrs. Allen, Lydia Flocchini who

assists with development, and Jamie Allen who is the president of the Women's Guild. Initial reports of the money raised are very promising. On Monday, our parish begins our annual Simbang Gabi celebration in preparation for Christmas. This is a tradition from the Philippines of celebrating a special Mass for nine days leading up to the celebration of Christmas. The main symbol of the celebration is the star (parole) which we have adorning our church. The Mass is daily at 6:00 AM and will be celebrated by a different priest each day from our area. On Monday, Archbishop Cordileone graciously offered to come and celebrate the first Mass. He was here a few years ago so it was a good time to invite him back once again. Thank you to Nellie Hizon and her team for getting things organized with the celebration.

As you know, for the past couple of years, we have been praying the Saint Michael Archangel Prayer at the conclusion of Mass. With our parish 75th Jubilee approaching next year, I asked our own Father Michael Liliedahl to compose a special prayer for our parish jubilee year. That being said, we will conclude praying the Saint Michael Prayer next weekend (4th Sunday of Advent), and then take a brief break before beginning our jubilee year with our parish prayer in January.

As we approach Christmas, I am placing in the bulletin another reflection on the Advent season from my colleague Father Kurt Belsole, OSB, which speaks on the "O" Antiphons of the Advent season. I hope you enjoy it.

Our Saint of the Week St. Flannan

Ireland and Scotland both honor St. Flannan. He was educated by monks, stayed close to nature, made a pilgrimage to Rome, was appointed bishop, wandered about preaching, and worked miracles. All that makes him a classic Celtic saint. The son of Turlough, a Celtic chieftain, Flannan was educated by a monk who also taught him farming. His biographer says he learned how to "till, sow, harvest, grind, winnow, and bake for the monks." Against the advice of relatives, Flannan decided to undertake a pilgrimage by sea to Rome. Following the lore of other saints in Celtic literature, legend says that he floated miraculously to Rome on a stone. There the pope consecrated him as the first bishop of Killaloe.

Flannan led his diocese by traveling about teaching and preaching. His charismatic eloquence even persuaded his elderly father to become a monk under St. Colman. When Turlough asked Colman to bless his family, the abbot predicted that seven of his descendants would be kings. Fearing that kingship might fall on him, Flannan prayed for a physical deformity that might prevent it. His biography says that his face became disfigured with scars and rashes. As bishop, Flannan sometimes forcefully intervened to pacify petty clan wars.

REJOICE

The prophetic writings we hear in today's scriptures call us to rejoice and celebrate the goodness of God. Zephaniah, Isaiah, Saint Paul, and John the Baptist in Luke's Gospel all follow the rich tradition of the Biblical prophets, a tradition that reaches full expression in Jesus. The prophets warn that human failings have truly disastrous consequences. All are



summoned to repent, and to change their lives. Today we hear the Good News that God's gracious love exceeds and overcomes all human corruption. God has not given up on us. Indeed, God keeps pursuing us, and eagerly seeks to reconcile with us. God's initiative to set the world aright culminates with Jesus, whose coming John the Baptist announces. John's prophetic message summons us to join in God's reconciling work, by living generously and justly in our daily lives. As we rejoice in God's grace, we then extend the fruits of this grace to all.

Background on today's Gospel Reading

Gospel Reading

Luke 3:10-18 John the Baptist teaches the path of repentance and announces Christ.

"Sing and shout for joy, for great in your midst is the Holy One of Israel"

Background on the Gospel Reading

This Sunday's Gospel continues last week's focus on John the Baptist and his role in preparing the way for Christ. Recall that last week's reading described John's appearance in the desert and established his connection with the prophetic tradition of Israel. If we were to read Luke's Gospel continuously, we would learn about John the Baptist challenging the crowds who came to him and calling upon them to show evidence of their repentance. John tells his listeners that they cannot rely on their lineage as Israelites because children of Abraham can be raised up from stones. Repentance, rather, must be observable in one's actions. Here, Luke is continuing to set up two important themes of his Gospel message: the Christian faith is expressed in one's actions, and the call to salvation is extended to everyone, Jews and Gentiles.

In today's Gospel reading, the crowds ask John the Baptist for specifics. What evidence of repentance is required? John replies by naming concrete actions: crowds should share their food and cloaks; tax collectors should be just; soldiers should act fairly. The concern for justice is a hallmark of Luke's Gospel.

When the crowd begins to wonder if John the Baptist might be the Messiah, John interprets his baptism and makes it clear that his ministry is in preparation for the Messiah. John the Baptist knows his place and role in God's plan of salvation. By encouraging the crowd to act similarly in accordance with their stations in life, John's teaching suggests that each person has a role to play in God's salvation. It is the great mystery of our salvation that God permits and even asks for human cooperation in his divine plans.

The third Sunday of Advent is also called Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is a Latin word that means "rejoice." This name is taken from the entrance antiphon for Sunday's Mass, which is also echoed in today's second reading from the Paul's letter to the Philippians. Some people mark this Sunday by lighting a pink candle instead of a purple one on their Advent wreath. It is a reminder that the Advent season is a season of joy because our salvation is already at hand.




The gift of generosity

Reflections on the "O" Antiphons of Advent

On December 17th, the Church's Advent liturgy begins to focus in a particular way on the Nativity of the Lord. The prayers, readings, and preface at Mass as well as the readings, antiphons for the Gospel canticles, intercessions, and prayers at the Liturgy of the Hours concentrate more resolutely on the coming feast of the Nativity of the Lord than they did during the preceding days of Advent.



the Magnificat. Each antiphon, always sung in a very similar melody, begins with a title of Christ, usually taken from the Old Testament, and is followed by the petition that he come to us (veni) and act on our behalf:

December 17: O Sapientia (O Wisdom)

December 18: O Adonai (O Lord)

December 19: O Radix Iesse (O Root of Jesse)

December 20: O Clavis David (O Key of David)

December 21: O Oriens (O Daystar) [after this date, the days begin to get longer]

December 22: O Rex Gentium (O King of the Nations)

December 23: O Emmanuel (O God-with-Us)

When taken together from the last title to the first, the first letters of each title form the wonderful Latin acrostic:

Emmanuel Rex Oriens Clavis Radix Adonai Sapientia

As such, they form the Lord's response to the Church's ardent petition that he come (veni): Ero cras (I will be there tomorrow)!
