

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This week we celebrate Catholic Schools Week. Our parish school does incredible things to form our young people in our school learning expectations: Prayerful Christians, Effective Communicators, Accountable Citizens, Confident Learners, and Empathetic Individuals (PEACE). I am grateful for the work of our principal Mrs. Allen and her talented team of teachers and staff in the primary school, and Mrs. O'Shaughnessy who directs our preschool for the youngest members of our school. The school has an exciting week of activities to celebrate for this week starting with our students helping to lead us in our prayer this Sunday at the 10:30 AM Mass.

Next weekend, the Church celebrates the Presentation of the Lord at Mass, sometimes referred to as Candlemas. This feast day commemorates Mary and Joseph bringing the baby Jesus to the Lord in the Temple 40 days after his birth. The feast day is always February 2 and when it falls on a Sunday, that is the Mass we celebrate for the weekend. There are two special features of the celebration. First, it is the World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life, meaning a day to pray for all women and men who live consecrated lives. In particular, these are women and men in religious orders. Over the years, our parish has been served by many religious sisters and brothers, and we are grateful for their ministry and contributions to our parish community over the years.

The other feature of the celebration is the annual blessing of candles. This is connected to the ancient tradition of this day being the end of the Christmas season with Christ being the Light of the World. At the beginning of all our Masses next week, we will bless the liturgical candles we will use in the coming year on our altar. Parishioners are invited to bring to Mass a special candle(s) to be blessed. We plan to have a special table in the front of the sanctuary for the candles and then people may pick up their candles after Mass.

The following day, Monday, February 3 is the Memorial of Saint Blaise, Martyr. We will have the annual Blessing of Throats after the 8:00 AM Mass that day as we implore the saint's intercession against illnesses.

Our Saint of the Week St. Thomas Aquinas - January 28

Thomas Aquinas came from a wealthy Italian ruling family in the 13th century. At age five, he was sent to a Benedictine monastery at Monte Cassino in hopes that someday he would be abbot. But King Frederick III sent his troops to occupy the monastery as a fortress. Thomas then transferred to the University of Naples, where he came into contact with the Dominicans.



Their life of prayer and study fascinated him, and he was determined to join them. His family was shocked that Thomas would join a group of poor friars. His mother sent his brothers after him. They kidnapped and imprisoned him for more than a year at a family castle. Nothing would shake his resolution to enter the Dominicans. Finally, Thomas's family gave up on discouraging him from becoming a priest, and in 1244, he joined the order.

Thomas studied under Albert the Great. In class, his silence during discussions and his large size earned him the nickname "the dumb ox." Thomas became well known for his writings in philosophy and theology. His most famous work, the Summa Theologiae, contains five volumes of thought on all the Christian mysteries. It is said that no one has equaled the depth of understanding and clear reasoning that Thomas showed. His love for Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament led him to write prayers and hymns that are still used to honor the Eucharist. But this brilliant man was very humble. He knew that all his gifts came from God. While celebrating Mass on December 6, 1273, he received a revelation from God. After that, he stopped writing. He said that all he had written was so much straw after what he had seen in the revelation. Thomas died at age 49 on his way to the Council of Lyons, France. Pope Gregory X had asked him to come. Saint Thomas Aquinas is a Doctor of the Church and patron of Catholic schools.

LIVING AS THE BODY OF CHRIST

Some of Saint Paul's best known and most beloved imagery is contained in the passages from First Corinthians that we have heard last week and this week: the many gifts granted by the one same Spirit and the many members making up the one Body of Christ. Few passages from sacred scripture more accurately sum up how Christian vocations work together.

Unlike some of Paul's other writings, which are a product of the social and religious conventions of his time, these enable us to look at our own lives and the lives of those around us to discern what gifts, what vocations the Holy Spirit has given for the good of all. We can likewise know the joys and sorrows of the other members of the Body and share in them for the strengthening of the whole Body of Christ.

Formation of two new parishes in the southwestern residential area of San Francisco was announced this week by the Office of Archbishop John J. Mitty.

Rev. Richard W. Power, chaplain at St. Mary's Hospital since June 30, 1947, has been appointed pastor of St Stephen Parish. The church is to be erected on Eucalyptus

Residents of the new Lakeshore Park sector, Lakeside, Stonestown, White City, and a part of the Pinelake area are included in the boundaries of St Stephen's. The parish extends generally from Sloat Blvd. on the North - except for the Pinelake sector - to Holloway Ave. on the south; and from Junipero Serra Blvd. on the east to the Pacific Ocean.

Father Power announced that Mass will be celebrated shortly in the basement of the present St. Stephen residence at 475 Eucalyptus Dr.

Father Power was born on June 6, 1906, in County Limerick, Ireland. He attended St. Patrick's College, Thurles, and was ordained there on June 15, 1930, for the Archdiocese of San Francisco.

He served as assistant pastor of St Anselm's Church, San Anselmo, from 10/26/1930, to 9/13/1937, of Holy Name Church, San Francisco from 9/13/1937, to 9/25/1942, when he was commissioned a chaplain in the United States Army.

During World War II he served with the Air Corps at Bainbridge, Georgia, and overseas in Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, Germany and England.

He returned to the United states in February, 1946, and was assigned as assistant staff chaplain with the Fourth Air Force in San Francisco and at Hamilton Field.

He was separated from active service on June 30, 1947, with the rank of Major.

Father Power was awarded the Bronze Star Medal on March 3, 1945, for meritorious service in connection with the military operations of the 324th Fighter Group in Italy, France and Germany. *(edited for brevity)*
