

Online Giving Transition

As we have been announcing, we are almost done with the process of transitioning to a new platform for our online giving for our parish community. We are doing this to streamline our office operations



from two platforms to a single platform and to bring this and our parish database under one roof. We believe this will not only help office workflow but also save our parish money in the long term. The new provider may be a familiar Catholic company to some of you, Our Sunday Visitor (OSV). Besides being a publisher of books and news, they also support parishes with stewardship resources like online giving and envelopes.

During the period of transition, we ask that you stop your reoccurring offerings in the old platform (Realm or Vanco) and set them up in the new online platform with OSV. We will have the systems running parallel through the end of March at which time we will take the older systems offline.

One of our parishioners, Connie D'Aura, is available to assist parishioners make the transition to the new site if they encounter difficulties. You may reach out to her at <u>donations@saintstephensf.org</u> Users of the current/ newer system (Realm) may follow the old links on the parish website to make their updates

(<u>saintstephensf.org/give</u>). For parishioners using the older Vanco site, you may need to reach out to Connie for access and she will be able to assist you. Your profiles and giving history should be updated in the new OSV database.

Saint Turibius of Mongrovejo

Turibius, a member of a wealthy Spanish family in the 16th century, was a brilliant professor of law at Salamanca University. As judge at the court of Inquisition, he dispensed justice. His responsibility and keen insight were praised by Philip II, King of Spain. Unexpectedly, the pope appointed this layman archbishop of Lima, Peru. Turibius argued, for he was



not a priest, had not volunteered, and had never been to South America. But the pope sent him anyway. Turibius's holiness and courage showed in every decision he made. God needed a man who would bring Christ's teachings to South America. Greedy Spanish conquerors had taken over the land and the people of Peru. Those wealthy landlords were guilty of oppression. In some cases, priests had joined the Spanish leaders in oppressing the people. It was a critical situation that Turibius faced when he rode into Lima, Peru, in 1581.

Upon his arrival, Turibius began visiting every parish and mission in his diocese, which took 7 years. He traveled thousands of miles. His journeys were dangerous because he went alone through areas plagued by wild animals and a variety of diseases. Sometimes going 2 or 3 days without food or a bed. The condition of the native people horrified Turibius. Thousands of baptized people had little idea of Christianity because there were no catechisms or Bibles in their languages and no priests for their missions.

Turibius gathered the bishops for the Third Council of Lima. They decided to print catechisms in the native languages, to set up classes for those in need, to regulate the sacraments, and to reform the priests. Turibius was firm, though understanding. He set an example by learning the indigenous languages. He spent his life baptizing and confirming, building hospitals, and establishing the first seminary in the new world. He fell sick while visiting a mission, dragged himself into a church in Lima, begged for the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, and then died.

From the Archive: Stained Glass Windows

St. Stephen Parish was established by Archbishop Mitty in 1950. The first masses were held in the garage of the temporary rectory at 451 Eucalyptus.

The school opened in September 1952, and the first mass in the church at 473 Eucalyptus (now Donworth Hall) was held on Easter Sunday 1953.

The new church was designed by architect Fred Houweling, Jr. It opened December 22, 1963. The pews, the Swedish marble altar and some of the walnut woodwork were moved from the older church.

The beautiful faceted glass windows were designed by Carl Huneke, Century Stained Glass Studio in San Francisco. He installed the windows over a two year period between 1963 and 1965. Mr. Huneke was a parishioner of St. Stephen's. The clerestory windows in the nave and the rose window in the choir illustrate the Joyful, Glorious, and Sorrowful Mysteries. The triptychs in the sanctuary and the children's room are of individual saints selected by donors of those windows, as are the small windows next to the pews in the nave. The very large windows in the stairways to the choir depict St. Patrick and the patron saint of the parish, St. Stephen. The faceted glass from which the windows were created is inch thick glass set in a thin matrix of epoxy so that the carefully chipped edges of the glass provide rich color variations from the refracted light.

Carl Huneke was born in Achim bei Bremen, Germany. He started his apprenticeship as a stained glass artist in Bremen at age thirteen. He emigrated to San Francisco as a young man. His passions were chess, hiking in the high Sierra and his art. His shop. Century Stained Glass Studio was on Fillmore Sreet in San Francisco



where he created windows for more than 70 churches in California, including the Cathedral of the Annunciation in Stockton, Saint Vincent de Paul Church in San Francisco, both in the tradition of the great cathedrals of Europe, and Saint Stephen's Church in San Francisco, where he pioneered the creation of faceted glass windows. He was a parishioner of St. Stephen and this was the first church for which he created the new style of faceted glass windows.


