Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Alleluia! Christ has Risen and he has appeared to Simon.

This day completes our joy as the dawn of new life is upon us. There are so many things in life that get us down, weigh us down, and tear us down. As we read this and I write it, each one of us can likely think of something right away in our life that qualifies. But today is a day to recall that our lives are not overtaken by clouds or a dark tunnel, but a day when God shines his


Jeff Yanos



From the Archive:

O' Neill's Brick

An Irish brick is not red, but rather stone grey, such that when used to build, the structure takes on a rock like hue of granite. Now once there was small poor parish on the outskirts of western Ireland. The parish priest, Father Brendan was left with a dilapidated structure that needed much repair. In fact, while in deep prayer one night, Father fell asleep and had a vision that a new church arose on the flat terrace directly next to the old church, which dated its construction back to the late 1700's. Inspired by this dream he spoke about it at his Homily the next Sunday in hope of some inspiration, for his parishioners, but alas it fell upon deaf ears.

Sitting in row eleven, was Shelia O'Neill, her ears were not deaf, and she returned home to share Father Brendan's homily to her husband Billy O'Neill, who though born a Catholic, had as they say, fallen off the faith a bit and was a Christmas/Easter man. "Billy," Shelia intoned, "we need to help, and you know bricks." He, of course, being out of work at the time, was a brick layer. "For what can I do?" he spoke in a plea to his wife, "me with no work and no way to pay for a thing for our own children." Unnerved he left their humble stone home to head to Gallagher's pub for a thoughtful Guiness. Walking home later that evening after a few more thoughtful Guinesses than he intended, Billy tripped and fell flat on his stomach and upon reaching back to see the culprit of his fall found a single grey brick. He picked it up and the next morning showed it to Shelia." It is a sign Billy," she said "go to father now and show him." Whereupon Billy did so with brick in hand, went to Father Brendan and though his head and stomach still hurt from the prior evening's affair knocked on the rectory door.

Father Brendan opened his door, with a bit of a surprised look and he greeted Billy, "Good morning to you Billy, it is nice to see you here, and to what do I owe this pleasure?" "Father, I know you're looking to build a new church and Shelia, says to me this," and at that he extended his hand with the brick, "came out of nowhere to catch my foot and down I went last night and it is yours to use for it has done me no good." "Well, well," says Father Brendan, it is a blessing that you thought of me and your Parish here. Let's have a cup of tea and bring the brick in." Whereupon the brick and the two of them at the table discussed the building of the new St. Paul's Church.

That day on the terrace Father and Billy took string and stakes and outlined the perimeter of the church, and Billy and Father placed the brick on one corner. Father blessed the brick, and Billy went on his way. The next Sunday to everyone's surprise Father Brandan's homily was focused upon the words of Saint Paul in 1 Corinthians, that we, like the parts of our body serve the whole, each serve Christ in our own way and Billy O'Neill and his brick were serving Christ in a noble way. As Father intended, that day Billy and his brick became quite a celebrity. No sooner was the Mass over, when everyone went to see Billy's brick, and of course people, being as they are, there much mumbling occurred in the discourse that the brick was "not so special" and who was Billy O'Neill to show up the hero, as they could do better. Two days later the Morrison twins showed up at Father's with 14 bricks. Then the O' Tooles, not to be outdone, arrived with 120 bricks. So swift and before Father could say "Irish Hare running" the rectory was overflowing with bricks. Even the Reverand at the Church of Ireland hearing of the bricks multiplying like the loaves and fish in front of the Catholic rectory, had Mr. Lynch's foundry deposit a load.

With his chest out proudly, Billy and a crew of masons from Dingle placed the last brick in early April, and before the rain came a roof was installed. On the ground where Billy's brick was lodged was a small plaque done by Father, it said simply, "It takes one brick to build a house of God, if we but follow."
