

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This weekend we celebrate the civic observance of Mother's Day. I think it is safe to say that there is a special woman or women in each of our lives who we remember and pray for today. She could be our mother, grandmother, aunt, or sister. Perhaps she may be a teacher, neighbor, coach, or mentor. Whoever she is, let us pray for all these women today, giving thanks to God for their presence in our lives and His continued presence in their lives. In a particular way, we remember the names of these special women con our alter for the weekend Masses

which we place on our altar for the weekend Masses.

It is also a reminder that all of us have a special woman in Heaven praying for each of us, and that is Mary, the Mother of God and our Mother. During this month of May, may we recall in a special way her motherly intercession for all of her children here on earth.

We normally prepare the bulletin early in the week so as of when I am writing this, the conclave has not yet begun and so we do not have a new pope. However, I think that by the time you read this, we will have a new pope so we decided not to include a special papal transition section in this week's bulletin because it may be "old news" by the time you read it. Perhaps next weekend, we can have a special papal edition with the new pope. However, as part of the papal transition, one change you may have noticed at Mass is that since the death of Pope Francis, we do not say his name in the Eucharistic Prayer which the priest prays at the altar. Rather, we just pray for Salvatore our bishop since we do not have a pope. When a diocese does not have a bishop, we leave out the bishop's name as well. Once the new pope is announced we will begin to say his name in the Eucharistic Prayer. We say our pope and bishop's name as a sign of communion and unity with both the local Church here in the Archdiocese of San Francisco in the case of the Archbishop's name, and the universal Church in the case of the pope's name. This is what makes us Catholic, we have a pope and we have a bishop.

This week, Father Michael will be away helping Nativity High School of San Francisco as a chaplain for an outdoors program they are doing in Utah. For my part, on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, I will be participating in some study sessions for the priests of the Archdiocese of San Francisco taking place at Saint Mary's Cathedral. There are a variety of topics being covered by a general theme is marriage and family life. While I enjoy the presentations they prepare for the priests, I think I would prefer to be in Father Michael's shoes this week in the outdoors rather than in a windowless room listening to presentations!

Stories from the AAA

Your gifts to the AAA support such ministries as Retired Priests, Seminarians, Social Justice, and our Schools, as well as many Archdiocesan departments, including finance, human resources and others that help our parishes save money by improving the efficiency of various services and providing economies of scale. Here is one example:

Hospital Chaplaincy – a patient at a hospital in our Archdiocese was suffering from a serious illness that caused depression, anger, and even violence towards hospital staff. He asked to see a Catholic Priest. The caregivers asked the Priest to bless them for their safety and with the virtue of patience. The visit helped heal the patient spiritually and emotionally; it enhanced the relationship with the care givers and thus the healing process as well.

OUR SAINT OF THE WEEK St. Damien of Molokai

Joseph De Veuster, the future Father Damien, was born at Tremelo in Belgium, January 3rd, 1840. His was a large family and his father was a farmer-merchant. At the beginning of 1859 he entered the novitiate at Louvain, in the same house as his brother. There he took the name of Damien.

He arrived in Honolulu on March 19th, 1864, where he was ordained to the priesthood the following May 21st. He immediately devoted himself, body and soul, to the difficult service of a "country missionary" on the island of Hawaii, the largest in the Hawaiian group.



At that time, the Hawaiian Government decided on a very harsh measure aimed at stopping the spread of "leprosy," the deportation to the neighboring island of Molokai, of all those infected by what was thought to be an incurable disease. Four Brothers volunteered, they would take turns visiting and assisting the "lepers" in their distress. Damien was the first to leave on May 10th, 1873. At his own request and that of the lepers, he remained definitively on Molokai.

He brought hope to this hell of despair. He became a source of consolation and encouragement for the lepers, their pastor, the doctor of their souls and of their bodies, without any distinction of race or religion. He gave a voice to the voiceless, he built a community where the joy of being together and openness ss to the love of God gave people new reasons for living.

After Father Damien contracted the disease in 1885, he was able to identify completely with them: "We lepers." Father Damien was, above all, a witness of the love of God for His people. He got his strength from the Eucharist: "It is at the foot of the altar that we find the strength we need in our isolation..." It is there that he found for himself and for others the support and the encouragement, the consolation and the hope, he could, with a deep faith, communicate to the lepers. All that made him "the happiest mission-ary in the world," a servant of God, and a servant of humanity. In Father Damien, the Church proposes an example to all those who find sense for their life in the Gospel and who wish to bring the Good News to the poor of our time.

From the Archive: **Pastors of Saint Stephen Parish**—Part I

Father Richard Power (1950-1951)

Appointed by the Most Reverend John Joseph Mitty and called into active duty during the Korean War.



Father Joseph Donworth(1951-1972)

Instrumental in establishing St Stephen School which was completed on September 22, 1952, prior to the completion of the first church at 473 Eucalyptus. The first Mass celebrated in the new church was on Easter Sunday, April 5,

1953. The parish continued to grow and thrive, and it was apparent that St Stephen needed more land to grow. The Archdiocese bought a parcel of land on Eucalyptus Drive just opposite 23rd Avenue. The new and present church was completed in 1963. Father Donworth celebrated the first Mass on December 23, 1963. The former church was christened "Donworth Hall" in honor of Father Donworth.

Father Joseph O'Reilly (1972-1987)

Under Father O'Reilly's stewardship, new organizations were created – Caritas, RCIA, the Extension Center, a kindergarten class added to the school, training program for Eucharistic Ministers, and the School Board.





Father William Knapp (1987-1992)


During his term as pastor, Father Knapp improved the church by having a new carpet installed, remodeled the confessionals to allow wheelchair access and opening a transept in the church.



Father Knapp also initiated the first study to investigate the possibility of construction of a new wing for the school. He also commissioned the dismantling of the original church tower whose steel bars had rotted, and none too soon as one month later, the Loma Prieta earthquake occurred in 1989.

Father Mario Farana (1992-1993)

Created the Parish Council and the Building and Grounds Committee. His tenure lasted only one year as the Archdiocese selected Father Farana to become the new pastor at St. Paul's.



Father John Wester (1993-1997)

His first undertaking was welcoming St. Thomas More and its parishioners into the boundaries of St. Stephen. Father Wester was also instrumental in reviving the St. Stephen Choir, a high school youth group, and the convent converted into the Joseph P. O'Reilly Parish



Center. The Liturgy and Stewardship Committees were also formed during his tenure. Father Wester would eventually be promoted to Monsignor then appointed Vicar for the Clergy in July 1997. Msgr. Wester would again be promoted and on September 18, 1997, was ordained Auxiliary Bishop of the San Francisco Archdiocese. Archbishop Wester is presently the Archbishop of Santa Fe, New Mexico.
