

Pastor's Corner

June 15, 2025

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This weekend we mark the civil observance of Father's Day. We remember in our prayers those men who are our fathers, grandfathers, mentors, coaches, and teachers who play a special role in our lives. We give thanks to God for the gift of their presence in our lives and we remember them before the Lord in a particular way at our Masses this weekend.

A few weeks ago, we had a wonderful gathering of our 50+ Club with a special celebration of the parish's 75th Anniversary. It is a blessing to have such a wonderful ministry that brings together seniors, not only from our own parish but the neighboring parishes for fun and fellowship. A huge thanks to the primary organizers of the 50+ Club: Helga D'Arcy, Betty Ganduglia, and Cecelia Quintanilla. Also, thanks to Connie D'Aura, Mary Molly Mullaney, and Shay Ingelfinger who regularly assist with the games of Bingo and Bridge.

Monday, we are scheduled to begin our roofing work on the parish office. As you recall, this is one of the important projects we identified for the 75th Anniversary Fund. When I arrived at the parish last July, it was one of the first things the staff pointed out to me and when I went up on the roof I could see why. There were spots where there were no longer shingles but only the bare plywood skin of the building! We worked with the Archdiocese of San Francisco Real Property Support Corporation to put the project out to bid and for which we received three bids. The parish Finance Council reviewed the bids, and we selected Lawson Roofing Company of San Francisco, which was the low bid for the project. The hard cost of the project is \$81,873 with an additional 10% set aside as a contingency, so the total amount we have set aside in a construction account is \$90,060.30. It is the longstanding custom in the Archdiocese of San Francisco to use union labor for projects such as this as we are proud to support our brothers and sisters with living wages and in return, receive their trained craftmanship. While I realize some people see the high cost and ask if we should rather partner with non-union labor which may cost less, this type of financial sacrifice on our parish's part is a real, tangible way we put our Catholic faith social justice tradition into action through our solidarity with those who labor. It is also a timely reminder to recall that one of the reasons our current Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV, chose his name was to be in line with his 19th century predecessor, Pope Leo XIII, whose social encyclical *Rerum Novarum* set the stage for how the Church would understand human labor to this day. I am hoping the roofing project will conclude this coming week so next weekend you will be able to look up and see the new roof on the parish office building.

Our saint of the week: Saint Alban

St. Alban, the first English martyr, was executed during an imperial persecution sometime in the mid-third century. A prominent Roman citizen of the ancient city of Verulamium, he was beheaded on a lovely hill thirty miles north of London. There his namesake church now stands, surrounded by the town of St. Albans. Alban, while he was still a pagan, hid in his house a certain priest, who was running from the persecutors. He observed his guest engaged in continual prayer and keeping vigil day and night. And prompted by a sudden infusion of divine light, he began to imitate the priest's example of faith and piety. Gradually instructed by his wholesome admonitions, Alban cast off the darkness of idolatry, and became a sincerely committed Christian. The wicked prince heard that the holy confessor of Christ was concealed at Alban's house. So he sent some soldiers to make a strict search for him. When they came to the martyr's house, St. Alban, dressed in the priest's long coat, immediately presented himself instead of his guest and master, and was led bound before the judge. Enraged

that Alban had substituted himself for the priest, the judge ordered him to profess his faith in the Roman gods. Alban stoutly refused. Being led to execution, Alban came to a rapidly surging river which ran between the wall of the town and the arena where he was to be martyred. There a multitude had so obstructed the bridge that he would not be able to cross that evening.

St. Alban, eager for his martyrdom, approached the stream. And as he lifted his eyes to heaven, the channel immediately dried up, and he saw that the water had departed and made way for him to pass. The executioner observed this and, moved by divine inspiration, he hastened to meet Alban at the place of execution. Casting down the sword which he had carried ready drawn, he fell at Alban's feet, and prayed that he might suffer with the martyr or, if possible, instead of him. Alban walked up a hill near the arena. To make it clear to all that his prayer had dried the river, then he and his new Christian companion were beheaded. A beautiful church was built on the site of Alban's death, where centuries later Bede said, "sick folk are healed and frequent miracles take place to this day."
