Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

This weekend, we are including our annual parish financial report for the previous fiscal year (July 2024 through June 2025). This year we are including the breakdown of the numbers along with my letter. You can read it for more detail, but I want to thank the members of our parish Finance Council (Laura Birsinger [chair], Serafin Cabatic, Connie D'Aura, Hugo Delgado, Dan Holper, and Mike Fesko) for their advice and guidance during the year. I also want to thank all our parish benefactors for their

sacrificial giving of time, talent, and treasure. Without the varied generosity of so many people, our parish would not be the place it is today.

Thank you to Mary Molly who is getting our Advent Giving Bulletin Board Tree up and running. This year, there are two charities we identified to support during the Advent Season with the Giving Tree. The first is the DeMarilac Academy which is an all-scholarship grade 4-8 Catholic school in the Tenderloin District. The second is Catholic Charities-CYO. You can read the announcement in the bulletin for more details. In the past, our parish has been very generous with the Giving Tree and we thank you for your continued generosity.

This coming Thursday we have the great American civic holiday, Thanksgiving. We will have a special Mass Thanksgiving Day at 9:30 AM. We invite all our parishioners to start these days of gratitude by giving thanks to God for all the blessings he bestows upon us. There is no 8:00 AM Mass that morning.

We will take up a collection at Mass on Thanksgiving Day for the Saint Anthony Foundation, located in San Francisco's Tenderloin District, as a way to offer our support to some of the neediest members of our community on a day when we are grateful to God for what we have received. This Week's Readings Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

Even in our time, when democracy and equality are held in high regard, kings connote the idea of majesty, power and absolute authority. Fairy tales, cartoons and modern television specials about aristocrats of old seem to draw out our fascination with earlier times, when kings ruled their nations and received unquestioned loyalty. We see some of that splendor in today's second reading as we celebrate the Feast of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Indeed, the majesty of kings and queens of old is magnified several degrees as we contemplate Jesus, the image of the invisible God, who was present at creation, through whom all things were created, and who is filled with divinity. When we think of how vast our universe is – and we're learning more and more of its unbelievable size – we can only begin to fathom the majesty of Jesus, King of that Universe.

Yet the other readings move us to reflect on another aspect of kingship – service to the people and mercy to those in need. In the first reading, as the Israelites anoint David as King of Israel, they recognize not only his success in battle but his call by God to shepherd his people. The Israelites welcome David as king because of his care for them – the same care he gave to the sheep in his father's flock before God called him to kingship.

Jesus shows an even greater depth of care for his people. Enthroned on the cross – his only earthly throne to date – Jesus dies for love of God's people, to bring salvation and everlasting life to them. Even more, a short time before his agonizing death, he turns to the dying thief crucified next to him with merciful words of assurance: *Today you will be with me in Paradise*. Jesus shows us his identity as a serene, humble and loving King and God in his last moments on earth – the kind of King that we as Christians can joyfully give our own lives to. Jesus' majesty as the eternal God and King is matched by his love – a love that drove him to a horrible death for our salvation.

What does this incredible King call us to? How can we serve Jesus, whose power and glory as God are matched only by the depth of his love? As Christians, we are baptized into his service – each called to serve Jesus and his kingdom in a unique way, according to our particular gifts, temperament and life circumstances. As King and as shepherd of our souls, Jesus calls us step by step into his service. He reveals our call, our role in his kingdom, from one moment to the next – if we take the time to pray and listen to his voice.

As we follow our Almighty King this week, we extend a Happy Thanksgiving to you and your families as we gather this week giving thanks to Christ the King.

Dear Fellow Parishioners of Saint Stephen,

This weekend, I am providing our parish with a summary financial accounting for our parish for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. This report is for Saint Stephen Parish and does not include our school as the school's records are separate from the parish.

This report is for your awareness as a means of building and maintaining transparency, accountability, and trust. I take very seriously my Gospel obligation to be a wise and faithful steward of the parish goods Archbishop Cordileone entrusts to my care. I am grateful that we have a strong set of parishioners on our finance council who are generous with their time and expertise, our parish staff, as well as the support we receive from the finance department and support corporations of the Archdiocese of San Francisco, which assist all the parishes manage their human resources, benefits, finances, and facilities.

On the opposite side of this page, you will find our parish's operating income and expenses for the 2024-2025 fiscal year, along with a comparison to the previous year. While we continue to face financial challenges, with a deficit of approximately \$160,000 this past fiscal year, we have made meaningful progress—reducing our deficit by approximately \$110,000 from the previous year. This improvement reflects our community's efforts, though we recognize there is still important work ahead to achieve financial stability.

Our most important and telling stream of income is from our Sunday Offertory, which was down slightly over last year. Some of the amount from the other collections are also down while some collections rose. We are also trying to account for monies in other categories for better accounting (e.g. votive candles) and so this changes numbers from one year to the next. Our rental income from the gym and hall also makes up a large portion of our income from renting for receptions, events, and sports camps, but of course this is dependent on venue demand and is offset by the costs of maintenance and personnel maintaining the hall/gym.

We began our 75th Anniversary Fund in 2025 to address some maintenance needs around the parish. The first project of the parish office roof was recorded under the 24-25 FY, so that offset the income we received up to that point during the 24-25 FY. Otherwise, there were no major emergency maintenance projects we needed to accomplish and so that kept down our expenses. We did not attain our 2024 Archdiocesan Annual Appeal goal and so had to write a check for the difference which was about \$15k. As you may recall, we began to make staffing cuts at the parish over the summer and this was done in response to the deficit. These cuts took place this fiscal year, so the results of those changes are not reflected in this statement.

The loan our parish has on the hall/gym from the Archdiocese of SF Capital Assets Support Corporation continues to decrease with payments from the church and school accounts. As of now, the remainder of the loan is just under \$1 million, an important milestone for us.

Our parish is very grateful for the generosity many parishioners and supporters. In particular, we want to remember with gratitude those parishioners who remember us in their estate planning. This past fiscal year, we received one such bequest from the estate of Adelaida (Adel) R. Caunan, a longtime parishioner and office volunteer with our parish. Without her generosity, our deficit would be considerably closer to last year's deficit.

We continue to work trimming expenses for the parish and there continues to be progress in this area. The overall economy continues to be a boon for some and difficult for others, and so this also affects our parish and the donations we receive. Please continue to pray for our parish, that we may navigate our fiscal challenges and stick to our mission as disciples of Jesus Christ to preach the Gospel to the ends of the Earth.

If you have specific questions about our finances, please know I am available to answer any questions you may have. Please know of my prayers for all of us and please continue to pray for me.
